A Word ...

By the rivers of Babylon—there we sat down And there we wept when we remembered Zion. On the willows there we hung up our harps. For there our captors asked us for songs, and our tormentors asked for mirth, saying, "Sing us one of the songs of Zion!" How could we sing the LORD's song in a foreign land?

Psalm 137:1-4

I've always felt this is one of the most plaintive cries of lament in all the Bible. In this psalm, as the Israelites are marched away into captivity, from a homeland in ruins, by the conquering Babylonians, we hear their devastation and despair. Their world turned upside down, all of their

assumptions shown to be false, and they cry from their felt separation from their homes and from their god. "How could we sing the LORD's song in a foreign land?" is a cry that comes from their belief that God could only be present in their homeland.

As hard as the experience of exile must have been, it was also the experience that showed Israel that the presence of God was not confined to Israel, or the Jerusalem Temple. It showed them that the spirit of God can and does move through foreign lands and foreign hearts. This was a foresight of the coming of Jesus and his mission to free all human hearts by bringing all people to the knowledge of God's love.

For us today, this season of Lent is an invitation to enter a foreign place either through giving up something or by taking on something new. Through our efforts to forego the familiar or take up the unfamiliar we too can discover or be reminded of God's eternal presence and God's eternal love.

Cereal, tomato soup, hearty soups, mashed potato pouches, canned potatoes, tuna, pasta and pasta sauce, macaroni and cheese, chili, hash, beef stew, peanut butter, jelly, canned fruit, applesauce

cups, canned vegetables (peas, corn, carrots, green beans), pork and beans, laundry detergent pods.

Soon the Food Pantry shelves will be relocated to the basement in the "acolyte" room. The goal is during the Food Pantry hours we will also be accepting clothing donations as well. Volunteers are needed on Tuesdays and Fridays from 11-1. Please sign up for a shift on the list in the parish hall.

Far away, but still close at heart

riginally a member of Calvary church, Barbara Costa was there at the beginning of the merger when 4 churches came together (All Saints, Calvary, St. Mark, and Trinity) to form St. Mark the Evangelist. Barb said when her first husband died in 1993, she married Jim Costa a year later, having known him 30 years at church. She describes her unique wedding to Jim: "Since our kids lived in 4 states and a foreign country, we were married by Langston McKinney, a City Court judge, in his chambers at the Syracuse jail! A year later in 1995 when we could gather everyone, we had a Blessing of a Civil Ceremony event at Calvary—one of the last services there with 150 people present and the reception at Drumlins.'

Here is the rest of Barb's story in her own words:

In August of 2000, the people of St. Mark's gathered for Jim's funeral. A year later the people of St. Mark's gathered to send me off to seminary in Pennsylvania for a year. And in August of 2002 the people of St. Mark's gathered again to send me to live and work at Trinity School for Ministry in Ambridge, PA. I shall never forget you.

In the 21 years since, I have had a very active life both in the town and seminary. At Trinity,

I became the Community Liaison in 2006, bringing the town and the seminary to a position where they knew each other better. I served the community on the Downtown Development Corporation, gave the invocation at Ambridge Council meetings, and served on the Board of the Friends of Old Economy Village, our National Historic Site. I also celebrated both my 80th and 90th birthdays.

Last August, I moved once again, this time to the midlands of South Carolina to live with my son, Rick and his wife, Pat. I have visited them for 5-6 weeks each year for over 12 years, so I know neighbors and people at their church, where I also sing in the choir. It is a much less active lifestyle, and now that I am settled, I have begun to look for local volunteer possibilities. My mobility is an issue and I use a rollator outside the house.

Rick and Pat travel quite often and I don't always go with them, so recently I have joined you online a few Sunday mornings. It is good to see old friends and to hear you read the Lessons. Deb has my information if any of you want to be in touch.

Film premiere of Philadelphia 11 features CNY Episcopal priest

The first online screening of the documentary film, The Philadelphia Eleven, will take place at 8 p.m. on Friday, March 8. Tickets are available online and cost \$10. All proceeds will benefit the film's distribution.

About the film

In an act of civil disobedience, a group of women and their supporters organize their ordination to become Episcopal priests in 1974. The Church of the Advocate in Philadelphia welcomes them, but change is no small task. The women are harassed, some lose friends, and others are banned from stepping on church property. In this feature-length documentary film, we meet the women

feature-length documentary film, we meet the women who succeed in building a movement that transforms an age-old institution and challenges the very essence of patriarchy within Christendom.

The women who became known as the "Philadelphia Eleven" (or "Philadelphia 11") were Merrill Bittner, Alla Bozarth-Campbell, Alison Cheek, Emily Hewitt, Carter Heyward, Suzanne Hiatt, Marie Moorefield, Jeannette Piccard, Betty Bone Schiess, Katrina Swanson, and Nancy Wittig. Schiess was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, but earned her master's degree from Syracuse University. The screening will conclude with a live panel discussion with esteemed panelists: the Rev. Dr. Carter Heyward, the Rt. Rev. Nedi Rivera, the Rev. Nancy Wittig and filmmaker, Margo Guernsey. The panel will be moderated by Katie Sherrod.

About the Rev. Betty Bone Schiess

Betty Bone Schiess (April 2, 1923 – October 20, 2017) was one of the first female Episcopal priests in the United States, and a member of the Philadelphia Eleven. During the late 1960s,

Schiess worked with the Syracuse National Organization for Women chapter to reform the Episcopal church. She earned her Master of Divinity degree in 1972 from the Rochester Center for Theological Studies but was denied ordination due to her sex. In 1974 the Episcopal Church did not allow women to be ordained: efforts at two general conventions of bishops had failed. Eventually, however, she was ordained in 1977 and served at chaplain at Syracuse from 1976 to 1978 and at Cornell from 1978 to 1979.

- ► Fr. Jon is working at a new Altar Guild manual.
- ▶ At the Annual Diocese Convention, a resolution was passed to add a weekly prayer against Gun Violence.
- ▶ Fr. Jon encourages everyone to join his online Bible Study on Monday evenings.
- ▶ Volunteers are needed to manage the Clothes Closet donations and Food Pantry customers on Tuesdays and Fridays from 11:00 1:00. Future plans include the moving of the vestments upstairs and the Food Pantry downstairs.
- ▶ The Annual Meeting will be on March 3, 2024, which is also Fr. Jon's birthday.
- ▶ We have not heard from our assessment appeal as there hasn't been a board meeting.
- ▶ Nancy Tucker presented us with 3 online donation possibilities. More information will be forthcoming.
- ▶ The cleaning service hired has begun their weekly cleaning.
