VPOD AND SECURITY

One of the roles of the <u>VPOD or the Vestry Person on Duty</u> is to secure and monitor the activity in the building before, during and after the service. In order to be reasonably sure that the building is secure yet still open to anyone wishing to attend services, the ramp door on West Genesee Street and the main doors of the church on St. Mark's Ave, where there is a chair lift if needed. will remain open throughout the service and locked by the VPOD at the end of the Coffee Hour once all parishioners have left the building. All other doors will be secured by 10:15 by the VPOD.

Note: Both of these entrances are handicap accessible.

Christmas Clothes Closet & Green Café receives warm welcome back

Although this year's Christmas Clothes Closet and Green Café were not as busy as previous years, those who attended and hosted it agreed it was so good to be able to open it up to our neighbors once more after last year's was canceled due to COVID-19.

"Everyone who did come had a great time," said Gary Neddo, Green Café co-coordinator along with his wife, Cheryl. "Everyone went home with a gift bag that included three boxes of Girl Scout Cookies and a bag with two loaves of bread – one a regular loaf and the other a swirled bread."

Those who attended this scaled-down version of the Christmas Clothes Closet and Green Café were able to enjoy a delicious holiday breakfast with Santa and most importantly, some good fellowship over a cup of hot coffee or cocoa.

In the Clothes Closet, shoppers were able to find all sorts of warm winter and seasonal clothes along with all types and sizes of much-needed winter coats, hats, scarves, gloves and mittens and even some boots.

For those shopping for others, the Vestry Room was transformed into a small gift boutique for Christmas shopping.

And everything – clothes, winter gear and gifts – were only a quarter donation! Of course, those who couldn't afford it were not turned away. All monies raised through the Clothes Closet go to fund our Food Pantry which is available to our 13204 neighbors.



This collaboration makes great \$en\$e!

Recently, St. Mark's <u>Food \$en\$e</u> program was blessed with some enthusiastic and muchneeded volunteers from <u>AccessCNY</u> who made it their mission to help out during the busy December Food \$en\$e delivery. Sponsored and operated by the Food Bank of CNY, the Food \$en\$e program offers the community the opportunity to stretch their food budget dollars by offering a significant unit of food each month for only \$20.50. St. Mark is one of 40 sites for ordering and for delivery of the food within the Food Bank's 11 county region and one of just 3 in Syracuse.

Earlier this year, Onondaga *CASA*, one of *AccessCNY*'s programs that connects community volunteers, known as Court Appointed Special Advocates *(CASA)*, with neglected and abused foster children, learned about *Food \$en\$e* and began ordering through our site.



"The *Food* \$*en*\$*e* program benefitted Onondaga *CASA*," said Nikki Bomasuto, Director of Development, Communications and Advocacy for *AccessCNY*. "Foster kids are often deprived of a 'normal' childhood and lack a strong parental figure who can advocate for their best interests. So, *CASA*'s step in to be that advocate. *CASAs* are dedicated to advocating for each child's best interests, both in and outside of the courtroom." She explained that the volunteers who attended the *Food* \$*en*\$*e* delivery day to help

unload and pack up orders were from their Day Habilitation program. This program is for adults with developmental disabilities who want to build life skills and explore their interests alongside their peers. She said together with staff, the group chooses activities that help build independent living and relationship skills. The program is also designed to build knowledge on how to effectively advocate for oneself.

"Initially, CASA partnered with St. Marks for convenience for the people we serve," Nikki



said, "but now we stay for the friendliness and the organization making our distribution days seamless. Our families are so grateful for the food and the reliability of the monthly deliveries, and our volunteers are grateful to have something to consistently provide to the families which allow increased access and support to the children."

This collaboration is a win-win all around. St. Mark Food \$en\$e co-coordinator, Jim Miller,

said, "We were pleasantly surprised when an unexpected 'gift from heaven' showed up on the December 15th delivery day. That gift, 7 young people from *AccessCNY*, showed up in a van to help us unload the truck and package the 'units.' Each unit contains 12 food items and are boxed for distribution. The arrival of these young people was a total surprise. What our parish volunteers who tend toward 'mature' status need is young people to help with this task!"

Nikki pointed out collaborating with Networks was a natural way to bring our programs together. Their participants get to join in on the support for families in need while getting some fresh air. The



participants who chose to volunteer did so as an opportunity to work on volunteer goals, communication and socialization.

"They liked getting out into the community and giving back to others," she added. "They also stated how welcoming and friendly the staff at the church were to them."

"Working with the four volunteers and the *AccessCNY* staff members (also young!) was delightful," noted Jim. "The volunteers took on the unloading and sorting with eagerness and are fun to have on our team. The best part of their help is that they too enjoyed the experience and plan to return each month! We thank Jonathan, Tina, Eric, and Beau as well as their guidance staff, Daysia, Ashley, and Shawanda."

veryone is familiar with the saying, "A penny saved is a penny earned." In this case, "A nickel saved is a nickel earned."



It is a true miracle of God answering all of the prayers you and we sent up. THANK YOU! One thing I would like to point out that might seem like a small thing, but to me it was huge and really touched my heart and meant so much...almost every time one of you checked in with me, you would ask how is "Callie" doing. Not "how is Jerry's daughter" or "how is your stepdaughter," but you always asked about her by name. That just showed me that your caring and concern went above and beyond. You all have a very special place in my heart and life, and I am taking this opportunity to let you all know it!








Making an impact
