A Word ...

Countless times in the Gospels, Jesus is shown in prayer. Jesus also taught the disciples how to pray when they asked him; giving the example we now call "the Lord's prayer."

"When you are praying, do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think that they will be heard because of their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him. "Pray then in this way: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And do not bring us to the time of trial, but rescue us from the evil one.



So it is clear that prayer is important in the life of faith. I would argue that it is probably the foundational discipline of a life of faith. Jesus' invitation is, first and foremost, an invitation to relationship. To be in relationship, of course, requires relating – that is, talking and listening to one another. The way to talk and listen to God is through prayer.

One thing to pay attention to though is the content of your prayers. Lots of people seem to think that prayer is just reciting a wish list of their needs and wants to God, like little children say to Santa while on his lap at the mall. There's a place, for sure, for your needs, but prayer is way more than that.

So, what should your prayers be like? Trust me, a quick internet search will offer you multiple systems of classifying prayer types. Largely, these all describe the same kinds of things, sometimes combining types others separate and use lots of different words to describe them. So, without claiming that these are the final word on prayers, I offer these six categories that your prayers likely should contain plus one that may not be used by you often, but which is important for many people. None is more important than the other, all have a place, so I offer these, in alphabetical order; Confession, Intercession, Listening, Petition, Praise, and Thanksgiving. Plus the bonus prayer type of Lament.

These prayer practices open us up to the world God is calling us into and towards the people Christ is calling us to serve.

But also to take moment each day, to look up and look around and see that God is good.

Discernment 2023

On May 21st we had our first parish meeting to begin a process of discerning how we might move forward into the future in a healthy and sustainable way. Father Jon gave a presentation outlining the kind of challenges facing churches across America and in our diocese as well as some that are particular to St Mark's.

One of St Mark's biggest challenges is to get as handle on our spending and our stewardship After each question, the groups shared out of the parish endowment to ensure it will provide for us into the future. Copies of the presentation are available at the church and can be mailed to anyone who wishes to see it.

The main focus of the first meeting though was an opportunity to talk about all things we love and appreciate about the parish. Those present split up into small groups of four and discussed together three questions;

What are the three or four things about St Mark's that you love or appreciate the most? Why are these things important to you? Think of an activity or experience at St Mark's that you think either worked well or was meaningful to you? What was it about that experience that makes it stand out for you?

Are there people you've known at St Mark's who've made a difference in your life or in your faith? What did they do that was so impactful?

their answers, producing a good conversation and not surprisingly, there was a lot of overlap in the group's responses. The key takeaway is that what people seem to love and appreciate most is each other as well as being part of the many ministries that serve our neighborhood.

► To reward engagement in pursuit of proficiency in two or more languages.

► To unite the home, school, and community by recognizing and celebrating multicultural and multilingual identities. St. Mark's is proud to have played a small part in their journey as new Americans!

NOTE: Our UTO grant in 2014, allowing renovation of the Undercroft, was entitled "The Trinity of the Undercroft." This reflected our goal of sharing our space with the Porter Elementary School and Hazard Branch Library.
