
Fr. Jon celebrates first service with St. Mark July 3



It was in Oregon that he became a Christian and joined the Episcopal Church, where he was a member of, first, St Michael and All Angels and later of St Gabriel's, where he was Warden. Sensing a call to ministry, he attended Bexley Hall Episcopal Seminary in Columbus, OH. He was ordained in Oregon by Bishop Michael Hanley.

The Undercroft Backstory

In 2014, with the growing use of the Parish Hall by AA, NA and other groups, St. Mark's needed additional multipurpose space for parish meetings and events. The Undercroft was largely used for storage and was rather dilapidated. We applied for a United Thank Offering grant to underwrite the Undercroft renovation and included in the proposal our on-going partnership with Porter and with Hazard Library. The design work was done by our late parishioner Jim Oliver and his firm, Robertson Strong Apgar Architects. It was designed and built to ADA specifications with a ramp entrance, separate restrooms, a kitchenette, and with the small stage saved. The estate of another loyal parishioner, Otis Shuart, was a major supporter of the renovation as well. The Porter staff used the space just one time in 2015. Their administration and staff underwent changes and COVID made its use impossible, so it was time to reintroduce their new administration and largely new faculty to it.

Your Vestry has been doing much thinking, discussing, and planning to keep us moving forward within our parish and community.

Here are some highlights of our May meeting:

- ▶ Pat Dunn reported that the Good Friday and Blanket Sunday collections were impressive.
- ► Committee meetings will be starting with the new priest-in-charge.
- ▶ Pat Dunn has ordered 2 video surveillance cameras with cam plus service. The cost of the service will be approximately \$60/year.
- ► Kevin Ward and Phyllis Honsinger volunteered to be delegates for the 2022 Convention in November. The congregation will be asked if anyone would like to be an alternate.
- ▶ Interfaith Works says they'll be collecting the monies raised for Ukraine soon.
- ▶ Jim Miller is busy organizing a Wine & Cheese Meet-n-Greet party for Porter School and Hazard Branch Library staff on June 23rd.
- ▶ A schedule was created for announcing our new priest-in-charge. This schedule included the writing and mailing of an announcement letter to the members and Father Gaetz easing us into an 11 a.m. service for a couple of weeks. Father Gaetz's last service will be June 26th. A luncheon will be held on that day to honor the devoted service of Father Gaetz and Kathryn Woods.
- ▶ At a future meeting, a discussion will be held about naming the Undercroft.
- ► As always, we began and ended our meeting with prayer.

Here are some highlights of our June meeting:

- ▶ This was the last Vestry meeting held be Father Gaetz! And yes, he was happy.
- ► Father Gaetz strongly recommends that we deal with the condition of the building, especially the roof and foundation. Many recommendations were made in the architect report of 2019. We need to consult this report and begin formulating some type of repair plan.
- ▶ At this time, some shingles will be replaced when we have some decent weather.
- ▶ Pat Dunn has gotten the video surveillance cameras and will be installing them soon.
- ▶ Jim Miller is all set to host the Porter School/Hazard Branch staff Wine & Cheese Party on June 23rd from 2:30 5:00. Jim plans on speaking briefly about the partnership and encourage them to utilize the undercroft for a variety of activities.
- ► The Vestry discussed holding a Lawn Sale in August to help with the Clothes Closet. Volunteers will be needed to help sort through the items and prepare for the sale. Help will also be needed the day of the sale. If you able to help, please call the office or see/call Phyllis Honsinger. A schedule will be available soon to sign up.
- ► As always, we began and ended the meeting in prayer. However, after our final prayer, we enjoyed some snacks with Father Gaetz.
