MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING, MARCH 14, 2021

The meeting was officially called to order by Fr. Nelson Gaetz at 10:05 a.m. during opening of the church service. Jackie Eberline, outgoing Vestry member and Chairperson of the Vestry Candidate Committee, announced the other outgoing Vestry members, Cherry Ottey, Vestry member and Barry Guinn, Warden. She then read aloud the names of candidates for warden and Vestry: Phyllis Honsinger/ Warden – 2-year term; Gail Manolescu and Nancy Tucker for Vestry, 3-year terms. Fr. Gaetz called for additional nominations for the floor for the offices of Warden and Vestry. No additional candidates came forward. He requested a motion that nominations be closed; **Dana Marzynski** made a motion to close the nominations which was seconded by **Joan Green**. Fr. Gaetz announced the polls would be open for an hour.

Service continued.

At the conclusion of the worship service, the meeting continued in the church sanctuary, being again called to order at 10:45 a.m. by Fr. Gaetz. He announced that Nancy Morrison and Bill Zimmer were appointed as tellers and the ballots were passed out.

Fr. Gaetz then turned attention to the minutes of the March 8, 2020, meeting. **Joan Green** made a motion to accept the minutes as presented; **Nancy Tucker** seconded. Minutes were unanimously accepted.

Fr. Gaetz then presented his Interim Rector's report outlining this unusual year courtesy of Covid-19 and added an additional thank-you for the parish's recognition of his 75th birthday on March 5.

Next, the Transitional Team's report was presented. Chair Jim Miller reported the Transition Team's job has concluded and the process has now moved onto the Search Committee, which is meeting next on April 12 with Cannon Carrie Broadbent-Schofield. This meeting will focus on training for candidate interviews.

Fr. Gaetz then moved onto other the committee reports to which there were no additional comments or questions.

The Treasurer Report was presented next. Joan Green questioned treasurer Pat Dunn on why there is no budget figure for St. Mark Youth Group. He explained there were no funds used last year so he budgeted none for this year. Dave Richmond, Youth Group leader, explained that because of the low attendance of the group, St. Mark merged with other youth groups in the Diocese. The churches all continue to help pay for the curriculum and lay teachers. The Youth Group raises its funds by bottle drives, which is spearheaded by Phyllis Honsinger. Pat Dunn said he will add the income into the budget as it comes in. Fr. Gaetz explained that the annual meeting cannot make a motion on adding the \$150 in the budget but it will be brought before the Vestry for approval. **Joan Green** made a motion that a request to adjust the budget for funding for the Youth Group be brought before the Vestry so the Youth Group has a budget to work with; this motion was seconded by **Nancy Tucker**. Joan also inquired about recent bequests made to the church and how they are designated. Pat explained that the bequests were added to church operating costs as well as the investment fund. **Joan** made a motion that the Vestry publicize the good news of the bequests received to encourage and inspire others to do the same; **Cherry Ottey** seconded the motion.

Next, Joan asked if the treasurer would apprise everyone regarding how St. Mark did this year financially and what 2021 looks like. Pat Dunn came forward and reported for 2020 adding the PPP loan helped, which covered eight (8) weeks of payroll and was eventually forgiven. He said the balance

sheet looked good at the end of the year. As for 2021, we have received \$45,000 so far toward our budget of \$49,000. He said 2021 is looking positive, thanks to the assistance of our investments. He noted that St. Mark will be able to furnish payment for a part-time priest. Joan thanked him for his report and for his service, which was met with enthusiastic applause.

Gary Neddo addressed the congregation and thanked them for their generosity and continued support of the church, despite services being shut down for part of 2020. But, he added, the operating expenses continue.

Joan then announced that along with the sanctuary lamp memorials, the flower fund will be starting up again.

Joan thanked Fr. Gaetz, the steadfast worship team and the office for all they have done throughout this difficult year to keep the church and the services going strong. Gary said that once we are through Easter, they will be looking to add more of the parishioners to the service ministry each week.

Pastor Gaetz then asked that the tellers to collect the ballots and there was a short pause while the voting process was completed and the votes counted.

Fr. Gaetz pointed out that although the weekly mission at Brighton Towers has been suspended, Bill Zimmer has been working faithfully as the go-between for Brighton Towers and St. Mark, handing out weekly service bulletins. He also reported 48 of our Brighton Towers members received ashes on Ash Wednesday.

Jackie Eberline announced the Clothes Closet, which has been suspended for a year, will be re-opening on April 10th with safety precautions in place. She said appointments to shop will be by reservations with 2 people allowed to shop per ½ hour time slot. A list of shoppers with contact information will be kept for contact tracing should it be needed.

Gary Neddo then recognized the hard work of the core group of committed Food Sense volunteers who have been working hard each month to keep the program going even throughout the 2020 Covid-19 restrictions. Jim Miller announced that this past year saw the addition of orders from Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), who received a grant to buy units of food for their clients. Members of CASA also have been helping as volunteers each week. He also reported that Cheryl Neddo, whose local connection normally provides monthly bread donations during the Clothes Closets, instead has been providing free bread to all Food Sense customers while the Clothes Closet has been on hiatus.

Fr. Gaetz declared at 11:34 a.m. that voting was finished and requested the election results. Nancy Morrison announced the election of Phyllis for Warden; Nancy Tucker and Gail Manolescu for Vestry. Fr. Gaetz thanked the outgoing Warden and Vestry members on behalf of the parish. He announced the installation of new Vestry members and Warden is slated for next Sunday, March 21, during the service.

Dana Marzynski made a motion to adjourn; seconded by **Jackie Eberline**. The meeting adjourned at 11:39 a.m.

As I write this report, I feel more than a little bit like a broken record. “Covid 19 strikes again.” But, that’s the reality of the past year. Once again, we continued to struggle to emerge into some sort of normalcy. We spent the entire year masked and distanced. In spite of that, some good things managed to happen:

- ✠ Sunday in-person worship was held mostly uninterrupted. My deep appreciation for how well people coped with changes such as restricted music and communion distribution methods. Special thanks to the “worship team” who worked so well together every week.
- ✠ Bill Zimmer continued to provide connection to our Brighton Towers “family” with bulletin/prayer/sermon materials delivered every week. He even managed to get the management to allow him to set up a worship space in the first-floor lounge for distribution of ashes on Ash Wednesday.
- ✠ Under the inspired leadership of my daughter, Kathy Woods, Live Stream of worship services became quite professional. Purchase of new/better equipment made this possible. Thanks also for a grant from the Diocese that helped with the cost.
- ✠ Meetings, especially Vestry, were held by ZOOM. It took us a while but by the end of the year we got quite good at it.
- ✠ I spent a lot of time on the phone, especially with people who were not able to get out due to Covid restrictions. I even managed to figure out how to have three-way conversations by phone. That, and texting, kept me in regular communication with the Wardens.
- ✠ Thanks to our outstanding Parish Administrator, Debra Denny, communication with the parish not only continued but improved. I hope you read those Newsletters and listened to the electronic robocall phone messages she sent out most weeks.
- ✠ The Search Committee was hard at work seeking a permanent Rector.

Most of all, I am deeply grateful to so many people who have made my extended tenure so rewarding – Yes “extended.” Hard to believe but I have been with you for 3 ½ years. Thanks be to God for each and every one of you – especially those I have failed to mention - and to God for our time together. Finally, I can’t begin to express my thanks to retiring Senior Warden Gary Neddo who took on extraordinary efforts. I could not have done this year, much less the last 3 ½ years, without him.

ALTAR ASSISTANT MINISTRY 2021

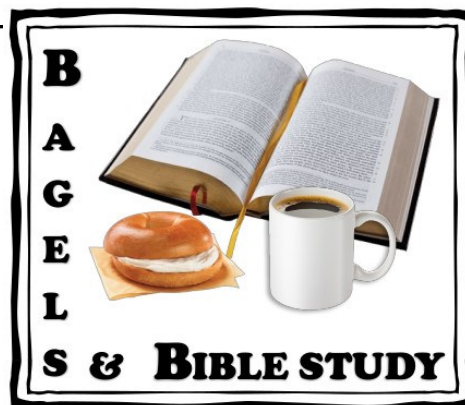
BAGELS AND BIBLE STUDY 2021

After just over a year of producing Live Stream services, we are nearly fully complete with the process. Live Stream has been going well with the addition of equipment through the grant that Jim Miller applied for through the Diocese. The only thing left to do is find a permanent home for the equipment and mount the cameras closer to the front of the sanctuary to obtain a better picture. There is new sound equipment purchased that needs to be set up so that all facets of the worship participants can be utilized. The microphone system is wireless and will give us the flexibility to use in many configurations of worship.

The addition of a Hymn Leader every week has helped with the sound of the congregational singing both in the sanctuary but more importantly on the Live Stream. Words to hymns are crisper and can now be understood.

We have a very loyal following of those who watch the Live Stream both in real time and the recorded version. While the addition of this media had been one of necessity, it really has become one that many rely on to be a part of the worship service every week. It is an important Ministry of the Church.

Now that we are moving toward a steady Live Stream, there is a need to create a Live Stream Team to continue once I am no longer present. Tommy Marzynski has done a fantastic job in the short term (by subbing while I was out with my dad) and will continue to be a valuable member of the team. Pat Dunn has pitched in also when needed. Phyllis Honsinger has taken over my old duties of Sound Technician. I could not put everything together every week without the help of Deb Denny with graphics. If you haven't watched a Live Stream, please take the time to do so. It really is great.

I am looking for some more willing and able additions to the team so that Live Stream can continue in the future. No technical ability is needed, just the willingness to learn. If you are interested in joining the team, please see me and I will set up a formal training day for those who want to venture into this important ministry of St. Mark the Evangelist Episcopal Church.

ST. MARK FLOWER MEMORIAL/SANCTUARY LAMP FUND **2021**

The Flower Memorial/Sanctuary Lamp Fund is used to purchase altar flowers and candles for the sanctuary lamp. They adorn our altar each Sunday and on special Holy Days. The flowers, candles, palms, Advent wreath, and Advent/Lenten greens are given as memorials or in thanksgiving. They are purchased through the generous donations of parishioners and friends of the Parish. After the Sunday service, the flowers are given to the sick, at-home members or are given to parishioners in honor of celebrations.

Funds were used to pay for postage stamps, small palm crosses, palms, plants for Easter and Christmas, calendars for Altar Guild, candles for votives, and flowers for weekly services. We purchase our flowers from St. Agnes Florist. On average, our flowers cost us \$40.00 per week and a \$5.00 delivery charge. The candle for the sanctuary lamp is \$5.00 per week.

MISSION & OUTREACH COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT 2021



The focus of “Mission & Outreach” is to initiate and coordinate Christian outreach. We seek opportunities for the parish to reach out into the neighborhood, the community, the nation, and globally. We seek to share the bounty with which God has bestowed us within the parameters of good stewardship. We seek to involve the members of the parish and to communicate the opportunities in which they can become involved.

As always, this has not been limited to the M&O Committee; rather, Circle V, the Youth group, the Prayer Shawl Ministry, the Clothes Closet, the Green Cafe and the Mustangs are just some of the parishioner groups who have initiated activity to support others outside of the parish in a variety of ways. Jacquie Eberline and Dana Marzynski coordinate our parish food pantry. Independent of the CNY Food Bank, this is supported totally by the in-kind donations of the parish and from proceeds from the highly successful Clothes Closet. The Green Café which accompanies the monthly Clothes Closet has only recently reopened and the monthly dinners are still on hold due to COVID limitations.

We started our 8th year in November of St. Mark the Evangelist becoming a Food \$en\$e site in the city of Syracuse! Bringing this program to St. Mark’s was the brainchild of Cherry Ottey. She pointed out our proximity to Porter Elementary School. We are one of 39 sites in 11 counties of the Food Bank of Central New York Food \$en\$e program. We are one of only three sites in the city of Syracuse.

The basic food unit costs \$20.50 and is made up of fresh and frozen foods as well as non-perishable food. The retail value of the “unit” is often double the \$20.50 cost or greater. In addition, each month there are 6 or so “Specials”- larger quantity packages of meat, cheese, produce or staples. The food is NOT donated or government surplus. It is all first quality and wherever possible from local vendors. Anyone may purchase the food with no regard to income. Purchases are made by paying in advance at the church the \$20.50 in cash or with EBT cards. No checks.

This year despite the COVID-19 pandemic, we were able to hold our regular ordering and delivery schedules. Even now, four of the rural sites are closed as all Food \$en\$e sites are 100% volunteer run. The program is chaired by Marilyn and Barry Guinn and Kitty & Jim Miller. Phyllis Honsinger, Leslie Hunt, Nancy Morrison, Sally Tullar, and Bill Zimmer help staff both ordering days and the delivery day. Our sexton, Phil Buffham, is also a major help. We invite volunteers to help with the monthly distribution typically on the third or fourth Wednesday. The times are 11:00 am – 1:30 pm, approximately.

The Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of AccessCNY continues to be an integral part of our program. These are volunteers who support families of children in foster care or in the court system. They are funded by grants. CASA orders 20+/- units each month to support their families. Beginning in December, Day Habilitation, another program of Access CNY, sends volunteers on delivery days to help unload the

truck and sort the items for the units. These young adults with developmental disabilities are eager to help and enjoy their experience in the community. This Spring, Gary Neddo will invite them to go upstairs, see the church and answer their inevitable questions.

In 2021 the Food \$en\$e orders consisted of:

- 585 “Units” (12 items each), up from 298 in 2020
- 619 “Specials”, up from 536 in 2020
- \$15,947.25 in sales, up from \$12865 in 2020. This includes \$5,220 in orders from CASA.
- Thanks to Gary and Cheryl Neddo, we were able to provide bags of Pepperidge Farm breads to every family that ordered a unit.

With COVID -19 precluding our traditional shopping for Thanksgiving Baskets for Porter, we again turned to our parishioners and friends to help us provide Wegman’s gift cards. Wegman’s kicked in as well (\$100). We were able to provide 30 cards. The Porter staff also supported our outreach to their families.

Collectively, the parish has:

- ◆ Supported UTO in the Spring and Fall. UTO is the United Thank Offering of the Episcopal Church Women, a nationwide funding organization. **[\$629.50]**
- ◆ Provided Wegman’s Gift Cards and Food \$en\$e turkeys to families from Porter and Frazer schools for Thanksgiving. **[\$924] 30 F\$ turkeys and 30 gift cards**
- ◆ Collected school supplies and back packs for Porter students, coordinated by the Mustangs and Circle V.
- ◆ Supported the Anglican Church in Jerusalem through the Good Friday Offering. **[\$629.50]**
- ◆ Supported the Food Bank of Central New York with our Food \$en\$e program.
- ◆ Provided 25¢ clothing items monthly through the Clothes Closet directed by Jackie Eberline & Cheryl Neddo (separate report) who also initiated the Green Café to accompany it.
- ◆ Provided hats, gloves, socks and underwear to the Porter school nurse and social workers.
- ◆ Five AA and NA programs continue to meet in our Parish Hall.

Although COVID-19 restrictions have limited most aspects of our outreach, we are still seeking ways to support our neighbors. The Food Pantry has continued. Food \$en\$e continues and the generosity of you, our parish family, continues strong. We hope and pray that all of our programs will resume in the near future.

In summary, despite the challenges of COVID-19, we have remained steadfast to the directive of the Lord to feed the hungry and clothe the naked and are itching to ramp up again.

ST. MARK CLOTHES CLOSET 2021

Once a month for 22 years we have operated a neighborhood Clothes Closet offering gently pre-owned clothes to families of our community for a 25-cent donation per item. This program serves from 30 to 60 people on average each time the closet is open. Many of these people live at or below the poverty line. Many are elderly and others have young families. Most, if not all of these people, are on fixed incomes. ***Free clothes are provided to anyone who is in need and cannot afford the requested donation.***



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GREEN CAFÉ 2021

After the renovation of our undercroft, the Green Café opened once a month during our monthly Saturday Clothes Closet. The café offers a free breakfast to individuals and families.

This program provides simple and nutritious foods such as oatmeal, applesauce, eggs, English muffins, bagels, pancakes and French toast. Coffee, tea, milk, hot chocolate and orange juice.

Many of the individuals and families who visit the Clothes Closet live at or below the poverty level making it difficult for them to have hot nutritious meals on a regular basis. Prior to the pandemic our Clothes Closet and Green Cafe program served as many as 60 people each month. Many of these people are children ranging in age from toddlers to teenagers.

OUR NEIGHBORHOOD BREAD PROGRAM 2021

In response to a neighborhood concern that one of the most needed items in many families' homes is bread, we started offering bread in May of 2018 for a 25-cent donation per loaf. At first the bread for this program was being purchased and donated by a family in the parish. Presently, the bread is being donated by a private concern in the Syracuse area. The bread is offered as part of the monthly Green Café



and the neighborhood dinners and as of January 2018 at the monthly Food Sense pick-ups. Bread is also offered as part of the grocery bags from the Food pantry. Free bread is given to anyone in need who cannot afford the requested donation.

Since the start of the pandemic and the closure of the programs listed above due to the pandemic, the bread has been given away at no cost to the participants of the Food \$en\$e program and the Green Cafe. Bread is also offered as part of our food pantry.

These programs provide a vital service to the people of our Westside community; people who have fallen victim to store after store being closed in their immediate area. The closest grocery store is over a mile away; while the closest clothing store is Destiny USA which many families in the area cannot get to or afford. We encourage all parishioners to join us to help out in the cafe or just to meet our neighbor over a cup of coffee.

We re-opened the Clothes Closet in April of 2021 and The Green Cafe in September of 2021 after a hiatus caused by the Covid pandemic. The number of visitors to both the clothes closet and the cafe have been small but growing. Since its re-opening, the cafe has operated at no cost to the parish.

Note: We have yet to re-start our monthly Thursday evening Clothes Closet and Free Neighborhood Family-Style Dinners. God willing, we will be able to re-start those programs once the pandemic has finally end.

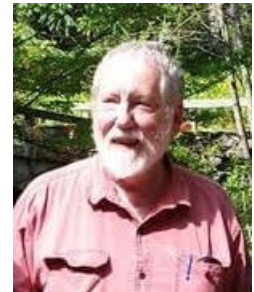
